# The Climate During the Time of Jesus

When considering how hot it was during the life of Jesus, it's important to look at the climate of the region where he lived—primarily ancient Judea, in what is now modern-day Israel and Palestine.

Judea is located along the eastern edge of the Mediterranean Sea, a region known for its Mediterranean climate. This means warm, dry summers and cooler, wetter winters. The areas where Jesus traveled—Nazareth, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, the Sea of Galilee—are all within this general climate zone, though local conditions could vary.

Summers in Judea were, and still are, quite hot. Daytime temperatures from June through September often reach 86°F to 95°F, with occasional spikes higher, especially in lower elevations like the Jordan Valley and the Dead Sea, where temperatures can surpass 104°F. Coastal and higher elevation areas, such as Jerusalem (about 750 meters above sea level), tend to be more temperate, with cooler evenings.

People of Jesus' time adapted to this climate in various ways. Daily life was structured around the sun's path, with many tasks performed in the early morning or late afternoon to avoid the worst heat. Clothing was typically loose and made from natural fibers to help keep cool. Shade and fresh water were precious, and homes were built with thick walls to insulate against both heat and cold.

In summary, we are living the days of Jesus! AMEN

#### **ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT 2025**

The 2025 Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference was held on June 12-14 at the Bayfront Convention Center in Erie. It is a time of "Holy conferencing" as defined by John Wesley when laity and clergy members gather for a combined time of worship, praise and church business. There were differences this year from other years due to the decreased size of the gathering. Instead of 1500 members as in other years, about 500 were present to do the work of the church. And, instead of breaking into sections to discuss legislation, everything was brought to the entire body to be voted on. This seemed to be more efficient.

This was our first annual conference with Bishop Sandra Steiner-Ball, who was appointed in September 2024. The theme of the conference was "Reconnect" and the bishop emphasized this theme in various ways. She said we must reconnect with God, with our communities and each other. She had the youth assist h er in the demonstration of baptism, as the members all recommitted their lives to God's mission. The water for the baptism ceremony was created from water brought from sources from every part of the Western PA Conference. The mixing of the waters symbolized that wee are all connected, all one. This comes from Romans 12:5 "We who are many, are on body in Christ".

A service of Ordination and Commissioning was held on Thursday evening with 3 members completing the course of study, 3 commissioned as Provisionary Elders and one Full Elder ordained. The evening concluded with the Recognition of Retiring Clergy, including Rev. Dayton Mix.

The State of the Church was a description of healing using the Spiritual "Wad in the Water". As God stirred the waters in the pool to heal the lame, he is stirring the waters in our conference to let those waters heal us. Also, it shows that when you walk in the waters, you disturb and change the flow of the water. We need to wade in the stirring waters to create a difference toward God's mission.

The Bible Study this year was led by Dr. Ron Bell. He spoke about conflict: what it is, how to cope with it, and how we can prepare for it. He said conflict is usually a lack of understanding and can be resolved by asking additional questions, listening, and putting yourself in the other person's place.

The last worship was a Service of Remembrance honoring those clergy, clergy spouses, and laity who had passed on in the past year. One of the highlights of this service for me was the opportunity to sing in the Conference Choir. It is a moving experience to join with approximately 40+ voices from all over the conference, laity and clergy, to praise God and remember all the faithful servants who have gone on to Glory. The sad part of this service was the recognition of all the churches that have closed in the past year. Aas the names and locations of these churches scrolled on the screen; I couldn't help but think of all those who had faithfully served in them for so many years.

A new vision was brought forward: Love Boldly Serve Joyfully Lead Courageously
The final order of business was the listing of the appointments for the coming year. It pleases
me to tell you that Terri Wells has been assigned to be pastor of Allegheny River Charge for another
year.

#### **VBS ALUMINUM CAN COUNT**


